Such a demand that an outside organization like La Mesa Directiva decide faculty appointments in this program injects the threat of extremists gaining adverse influence over the organization and thus college affairs.

No organization, no matter how influential or what group it is composed of, can responsibly claim to represent all members of that segment in the community. It appears from such exaggerated claims and childish actions of disrupting registration and injuring innocent bystanders one must wonder how responsible some of these Chicano activists are.
